SOCIAL ORDER: WOMEN PHOTOGRAPHERS FROM IRAN, INDIA AND AFGHANISTAN

ABOUT

Women have had a significant impact in the history of photography. Dating back to the earliest days of photography, particularly in portraiture, women have challenged, shaped and gifted us with innovative perspectives on the modern woman.

The modern woman is and will always be an ever-changing definition. We can observe the evolution of the modern woman as early as the 19th century to present day. Margaret Bourke-White was one of the first to make an impact as a photographer for LIFE magazine, Julia Margaret Cameron challenged the standards of portraiture set by men of her time, Sally Mann gave the world controversial perspectives of her children, and most notably, Cindy Sherman's conceptual self-portraits have positioned her as one of the most important contemporary artists living today.



This exhibition focuses on five contemporary women photographers from Iran, India, and Afghanistan whose work explores the role of women in the context of cultural constructs, religion, censorship and the media.

CRITICAL THINKING

COMPARE/CONTRAST
