ABOUT

Every year the Photo Center celebrates the graduates of the Certificate in Fine Art Photography program through a comprehensive exhibition of their thesis work. We are very pleased to present the work of our 2013 graduates – Daniel Hawkins, Chris Letcher, and Patrick Names. Thesis is the final course in the Photo Center Certificate Program and is designed so that each student may bring an extended photographic project from an initial stage to final realization. Students have an entire year to explore frameworks for building a long-term project with conceptual, visual and thematic components. These works not only mark the culmination of a year's worth of artistic practice but they also represent a new generation of Seattle-based artists.

ARTISTS

Chris Letcher's Con(Structure) explores photographic abstraction, riding the tension between what is perceived and its relation to the world. Letcher captures the variations of change, suspending the viewers between documentary and abstract reading of images. He seeks to give the viewer an experience that challenges their perception about what things "are" before they become defined or closed in specific meaning.

Absence / Presence is a personal exploration by **Patrick Names** of the mental, physical, and emotional toll of losing a parent. Through different artifacts (pictures, yearbooks, journals, etc.) he has been able to investigate the presence of his father in his life and has used photography as a medium in dealing with his absence from his father's death.

For **The Water Project, Dan Hawkins** has been traveling to locations around our region where the water meets up with our urban environment. He then shoots the location using an 8x10 camera and develops the film in the water from that location. This is either done on site using repurposed processing tubes or back in his personal darkroom. The resulting images range from unrecognizable swatches of color to images that are only slightly shifted. By working in this way the artist allows the materials from these specific sites to have an influence on the resulting images beyond the traditional light - lens - film relationship.

COMPARE AND CONTRAST

Rebecca Lawrence and Eberhard Riedel:

Documentary photography possesses the tremendous power to visualize history, to capture the movements and tensions within societies in the images which it projects. It educates and can inspire viewers to work towards change. Both Rebecca Lawrence and Eberhard Riedel are using art in order to raise a social awareness. Rebecca's color images capture both concern and, later, joyous celebration of a group of people while Eberhard's black and white photographs portray pain, hardship, and isolation. Both photographers successfully capture the emotion of their subjects, helping the viewer to be drawn in, becoming intrigued to look at the full story. COMPARE AND CONTRAST (Continued)

Elisa Huerta Enochian and Eva Sköld Westerlind: Narrative photography is the idea that photographs can be used to tell a story. In comparing the work of these two photographers, the most obvious difference is that Elisa is dealing with a non-fictional narrative and Eva is creating a story of fiction with inanimate objects. Their approaches are different but the narrative they create is strong. Do you prefer one over the other? If you were to tell a story through one or a series of photos, what would your approach be?
